

Please clean up after your dog

Under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996, it is an offence not to clean up after a dog has defecated on public land. A person may be issued with an £80 fixed penalty fine, if they do not clean up, or alternatively may be prosecuted through the magistrates court, where the maximum fine is £1000.

Not only is it unsightly, dog waste is a serious health hazard and there have been cases reported of children going blind after contracting Toxocariasis, an infection caused by worms in dog and cat faeces.

When out with your dog you should always be prepared to clean up after it. Dog waste bags are easily readily available from most pet stores. Plastic carrier bags can be re-used for the same purpose.

Dog waste that has been bagged can be disposed of in any ordinary litter bin or dog waste bin. If no bins are available the waste should be taken home and placed in your bin.

The dog warden can only take action against offenders if they know who they are. We need your help.

If you are aware of offenders causing a particular problem in your neighbourhood you can contact the dog warden or Studley Parish Council using the details below, who will investigate and take appropriate action.


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And There's Another Thing

These are the words that frequently accompany my interchanges with local residents in my role as a County Councillor. The discussion about nuisance parking can easily morph in to a reminder about the cracks in the pavement.

However it is mostly through concerns expressed in this way that I begin the sometimes tortuous process of trying to get something done about them.

The problems raised range from the removal of a dead sheep from a field to a bent lamp standard, from a school admission problem to a pothole.

Of course one sometimes has to explain that the County doesn't deal with something and point them in another direction and sometimes warn that in the context of the 'cuts' there might be difficulties ahead.

It's easy to think of a County Councillor as some kind of Ombudsman simply fielding complaints but of course the reality is that a good deal of our time is spent in meetings. There are Scrutiny committees that we regularly serve on – in my case, Children's Services. In addition we might serve on a group convened for a particular purpose. I am shortly to be part of a Select Committee on the future of Children's Centres.

I find that people get very confused about whom they should contact about various problems.

It is the County who deal with most highway, traffic and parking matters. The same authority deals with Social Care, Children's Services and Education matters. However it must be realised that takeovers by private organisations and Academies respectively leave Councillors sometimes 'at a distance' from influence.

In recent years I don't think it is fully appreciated what a disproportionate 'hit' local government has taken in relation to public expenditure cuts. It is also felt by Councillors from all parties that we are living in an increasingly centralised State.

As a result of the Local Government Association has launched a campaign entitled 'Rewiring Public Services'

The aim is to persuade central government, amongst other things, that people should be given a meaningful vote on a wide range of tax and spending decisions. In addition several government departments should be merged, outdated funding formulae should be scrapped in favour of a more needs based calculation and that ministerial powers over local democracy should be reduced.

With such a new deal for local government maybe more than one in three would vote locally and the frustrations I referred to earlier would be diminished. Oh brave new world.



Pam Taylor-Hughes, proprietor of Studley Florist will be doing a tandem skydive at Sibson Parachuting Centre, Peterborough sometime in August or September depending on weather conditions in aid of Studley First Responders.

The Ancient Art of Tai Chi and Chi Gong



Tai Chi is characterised by its' slow, continuous, flowing movements done in a calm unhurried fashion, often called 'meditation in motion'. Dating back to the 12th century this Chinese Internal Martial Art is now practised around the world for health and wellbeing as well as its' martial aspect.

The slow, gentle, sometimes more stationery, Chi Gong is a type of traditional, therapeutic Chinese movement or exercise that can look very similar to Tai Chi. There are many different systems and some, like Ba Duan Jin (Eight Pieces of Brocade), date back nearly 1000 years. Chi can be translated as breath or energy and Gong as training or practice.

With a core principle of balance and harmony, both Tai Chi and Chi Gong are concerned with cultivating internal energy or Chi (Qi). The slow, calm, rhythmical movements can, in a gentle low impact way, bring mobility to our bodies as well as encourage the smooth flow of energy through the meridians, promoting health and wellbeing.

With 5 main styles of Tai Chi and many varied systems of Chi Gong there's 'something for everybody', and with such evocative names as Swimming Smiling Dragon, Cloud Hands and Golden Rooster Stands on One Leg, it truly is a joy to do. Which is just as well as some scientists now say it's the perfect exercise as we get older and one of the best ways to improve our balance.

As for health benefits, research is now suggesting that this form of movement may:

Increase General Mobility Reduce Stress

Increase Muscle Strength Improve Balance

Increase Flexibility Reduce Arthritic Pain Help with Blood Pressure Management

While students report:

Better Sleep Improved Relaxation

Better Mobility Improved Energy Levels

Improved Posture Improved Joint Mobility

These slow, relaxed movements need no equipment or specialist clothing, no special diet or way of life, can be practiced just about anywhere and are suitable for people of all ages and ability.

An example of a good calming movement:

Feathers Down the Spine







Bring the arms, palms upwards, up the side of the body and up over our heads, by now our palms are facing downwards and we bring them down the front of the body. We can imagine that as we lift the arms upwards that we are 'supporting the sky' and as the hands come down the front of our bodies that our fingers are like feathers gently stroking our spine.

Remembrance Day in Britain

November is the time of the year when we wear a red poppy in memory of those who sacrificed their lives for us during wars.

The **eleventh hour** of the **eleventh day** of the **eleventh month** marks the signing of the Armistice on 11th November 1918 to signal the end of World War I.

At 11am on 11 November 1918 the guns of the Western Front fell silent after more than four years continuous warfare.

Remembrance Day is on 11 November. It is a special day set aside to remember all those men and women who were killed during the two World Wars and other conflicts. At one time the day was known as Armistice Day and was renamed Remembrance Day after the Second World War.

Remembrance Day is also known as Poppy day, because it is traditional to wear an artificial poppy. The Royal British Legion, a charity dedicated to helping war veterans, sells them.

Remembrance Sunday is held on the second Sunday in November, which is usually the Sunday nearest to 11 November. Special services are held at war memorials and churches all over Britain.

A national ceremony takes place at the Cenotaph in Whitehall, London.

The National Service of Remembrance at the Cenotaph in Whitehall is a unique expression of national homage devoted to the remembrance of those who have given their lives in war. It was originally conceived as a commemoration of the war dead of the First World War but after the Second World War the scope of the ceremony was extended to focus on the nation's dead of both World Wars, and in 1980 it was widened once again to extend the remembrance to all who have suffered and died in conflict in the service of their country and all those who mourn them.

Ministers and certain other Ministers and the Mayor of London are invited to attend the ceremony, along with representatives of the Armed Forces, Merchant Air and Navy and Fishing Fleets, and members of faith communities. High Commissioners from Commonwealth countries also attend the ceremony and lay wreaths at the Cenotaph



The service at the Cenotaph is framed to ensure that no one is forgotten. A wreath laid by the Queen and the other tributes placed on the Cenotaph are dedicated to all who have suffered or died in war. Members of the Cabinet, Opposition Party leaders, former Prime Ministers and certain other Ministers and the Mayor of London are invited to attend the ceremony and lay wreaths at the Cenotaph.

The 'Last Post' is traditionally played to introduce the two-minute silence in Remembrance Day ceremonies. It is usually played on a bugle (in military life The Last Post marks the end of the day and the final farewell).

The sounding of 'reveille' (or more commonly The Rouse) ends the two minute silence, followed by the recitation of the Ode of Remembrance taken from the poem 'For the Fallen' by Laurence Binyon (1869 – 1943).

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them

The first two minute silence in London (11 November 1919) as reported in the Manchester Guardian, 12 November 1919 –

'The first stroke of eleven produced a magical effect.

The tram cars glided into stillness, motors ceased to cough and fume, and stopped dead, and the mighty-limbed dray horses hunched back upon their loads and stopped also, seeming to do it of their own volition.

Someone took off his hat and with a nervous hesitancy, the rest of the men bowed their heads also. Here and there an old soldier could be detected slipping unconsciously into the posture of 'attention'. An elderly woman, not far away, wiped her eyes and the man beside her looked white and stern. Everyone stood very still ... the hush deepened. It had spread over the whole city and become so pronounced as to impress one with a sense of audibility. It was a silence which was almost pain...and the spirit of memory brooded over it all'.



Plants & War

During the First & Second World Wars many plants were used for medicine, camouflage and to help keep soldiers and the nation healthy. School children were given days off school to go and collect wild plants.

Sphagnum Moss

This amazing moss, which is found on peat moorland and bogs, was collected mainly during the First World War. Sphagnum moss was used as a wound dressing or bandage as it is very absorbent and has some antiseptic qualities.





Blackberries

During the First World War, children collected blackberries that were then made into juice rich in natural vitamin C for sending to soldiers at the battlefront to help keep them healthy.



Rosehips

In Second World War, the people of Britain were encouraged to gather wild-grown rose hips and to make vitamin C syrup for children and expectant mothers. This was because German submarines were sinking many commercial ships bringing citrus fruits from the tropics to the UK.



Nettles

The German Army used a fabric made from stinging nettles to make army uniforms during the First World War. During Second World War, nettles were used to make a dye for colouring camouflage netting.

Conkers

These were collected during the First World War to help make substance cordite. Cordite was like gunpowder and was used to propel shells.





Foxglove

During Second World Wall, County Herb Committees were set up to organise large scale collection and drying of foxglove leaves so that drugs which could no longer be imported could be made. A drug extracted from the dried leaves was and is still

used to treat heart disorders, although the plant itself is extremely poisonous and should not be touched.



Wild plants are still strongly connected with remembering war and lives lost in war. The field poppy has become a symbol of remembrance.

During the First World War, there was a lot of heavy fighting in Flanders in Belgium, and as well as loss of life the whole area was destroyed, becoming like muddy wasteland. A Canadian doctor, John

McCrae, was so moved by what he saw he wrote a poem called 'In Flanders Field' In 1918, American teacher Moina Michael wrote another poem 'We shall keep the faith' in response to McCrae's, and promised to wear a poppy in remembrance of those who had died. She began selling red silk poppies, and thus the tradition of wearing a poppy began, with the first British Legion Poppy Day held in the UK in 1921

8 incidents of damage reported including several domestic related, three vehicle related and two commercial premises. This is down on the previous 3 months

Theft from Motor Vehicle

3 incidents reported with owners leaving items of value in their vehicles. This is down on the previous three months.

Theft not Vehicle Related

8 incidents reported which includes a pushbike being taken and recovered the following day, bilking and the remaining being unattended mobile phones/wallets and purses. This is down on the previous three months.

Theft Shops and Stalls

4 incidents of theft reported. One from Co-op, two from Aldi, one from Tescos express and one from Costcutters. This is down on the previous 3 months

Rowdy/Nuisance

39 Incidents reported. Only five were Anti-Social Behaviour incidents. Eleven were involving vehicles, the remaining being drunks, and domestic Related. Two section 59 were issued following the incidents involving the vehicles. This is up on the previous 3 months

Robbery

No reported incidents. This is down on the previous 3 months .

Suspicious Incidents

19 reports of suspicious behaviour/circumstances. From members of the public calling about suspicious vehicles and persons. Some of the calls were involving persons doing legitimate work e.g. surveys. This is down on the previous 3 months.

Do you know what crime is happening around you, are you aware of what types of crime are happening in neighbouring towns and villages and do you know what you can do to prevent crime happening to you?
